### It's a wrap! With Vicki Hughes

This will be a mini workshop on making baskets with fabric and cotton clothes line. The workshop is free to members and \$10.00 fee for nonmembers. Please check the materials list and what preparation needs to be done before the workshop.

### *President's message...*

My most recent weaving acquisition, a 36-inch 4-shaft, Norwood (cherry) floor loom, has taken me down the path of some very interesting weaving history. A brass plaque on the frame proclaims it was Built for Regina M. Cavanagh by The Norwood Loom Co. in Chicago, Ill. There was no date on the plaque, but her granddaughter informed me it was built in 1950 for her grandmother who lived in Santa Barbara and "produced wonderful fabrics for draperies, upholstery, clothing, handbags, etc., sewn by my other grandmother when I was a child. We had the finest draperies in the neighborhood - silk and linen with subtle grey and nubby cream stripes on a mauve background. **How can I forget the look, feel and drape of that fabric...?"** This is affirmed by the 15-dent reed housed in the beater.

There were interesting tidbits of written history inherited with the loom, as well. They included: 1) a weaving syllabus for 'Santa Barbara Adult Day and Evening School taught by Russell E. Groff' whose introduction to weaving came as a result of his occupational therapy following an injury received while serving in the U.S. military. He went on to become an avid weaver, instructor, publisher and owner of Robin & Russ in McMinnville, OR. He (like John of Village Spinning and Weaving) traveled to weaving events, including WeFF. Earlier, he had a shop in Santa Barbara at 25 W Anapamu St, later moving it to 10 W Anapamu (just off the 1200 block of State St). I viewed both locations remotely, courtesy of Google Maps. Many of us 'seasoned' weavers remember him well. Russell is memorialized in this article: <http://www.weavezine.com/weavegeek/memori-am-russell-e-groff>.

2) Early publications of *Warp & Weft*, a magazine produced by the Norwood Loom Company, that included small samples of a weave structure each month. Samples include men's shirt fabric, carriage cover, spring coat fabric (sticky yarns treated with flaxseed dressing), and French provincial curtains, made from yarns not even available to us anymore. They advertised new Norwood T M-16 table looms for \$37.50 and Durene 20/2 cotton from Robin & Russ. A yearly subscription was \$2. So very interesting, but the paper is not acid free and it is falling apart. 3) A 1995 collection of Cross Country Weaving samples, not just the pictures.

As I lovingly apply Orange Oil wood conditioner to the wood until it can accept no more, I think: "Oh but that all distractions from my weaving could be so interesting."

I hope to see you all on November 10, when Vicki Hughes teaches us to make coiled fabric baskets. You will need a sewing machine with a zigzag stitch and other supplies – see the materials list. Guests are welcome (fee).

*Remember too* – Bring an item for our November raffle, and start thinking about *who you will bring, what items you will donate for the auction and what dish* you will bring to our December live auction.

Fall 2014 Weaving Classes

### Beginning Weaving

The Introduction to Weaving Classes on a harness (shaft) loom or rigid heddle loom are for beginning (no experience) and weavers who still need some guidance. A session consists of five 3-hour classes which are offered Wednesday evenings, Thursday mornings, or Saturday mornings. One or more projects will be completed during the course of instruction, but will require doing some weaving at home. Classes are conducted in Redlands, and require a membership in the IEHG guild. Students bring their own looms or may rent a table loom from the guild. Classes are limited to 3-4 students. Topics are

Basic weave structures with samples

Weaving and finishing your project

Measuring warp

Reading a project draft (as presented in magazines)

Warping your loom

Planning a project

Winding a shuttle

Costs: \$120 for five classes (Includes \$15 materials fee for one project)

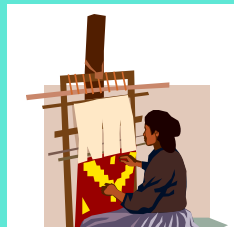

IT'S A WRAP MATERIAL LIST FOR NOV. CLASS

Sewing machine in good working order that does a ZIG ZAG stitch. This holds each coil of clothesline. If you have an extension table brings it or a stack of books the height of the sewing machine bed. This hold up your project while sewing.

COTTON clothesline minimum 50 ft. You'll find it at hardware store or Wal-Mart. NOT at Home Depot or Lowes

1/2 yard of fabric cut into 1" to 1 1/4" wide strips straight or bias cut. this will make an 8" by 5" basket

Matching thread or invisible thread for bobbin

Glue stick or a few pins (not necessary but handy)

Prep before class: cut fabric no longer than the width of the fabric but 18" to 20" is easier to work with and no wider than 1 1/4". They do not have to be perfect

To make it a bit easier unwrap clothesline as you go.

Wrap strips at a 45 degree angle around clothesline; make sure you overlap each wrap. You don't want to see the clothesline. You can glue or hold ends with a pin. You will get the hang of it and not need the glue

After wrapping clothesline let it fall into a bag, now our ready for class

This is a very good project in front of the t.v.
